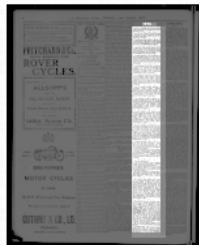

Mr. J. E. Rumble, of Sir John Jackson, Ltd, has returned to Singapore from a short holiday at home.

The Rev. W. E. Horley preaches his farewell sermons in Ipoh on March 28, and then proceeds on furlough.

The King has been pleased to approve of the nomination of Mr. Arthur Noel Kenion to be an Unofficial Member of the Federal Council of the Federated Malay States.

General Sir Thomas Kelly-Kenny G.C.B., G.C.V.O., aged 74, who saw service in China and Abyssinia and in the South African War, left unsettled personal estate in the United Kingdom valued at £83,221.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Paul de Oliveira which took place at 1 a.m. this morning at his residence in Leith Street. The deceased, who was one of the oldest members of the Eurasian community, would have completed his 71st birthday if he survived to see the first few days of next month. He was employed during his younger days at the Prye River Dock, which place he left about twenty years ago. He retired about seven year ago and was enjoying good health until quite recently.
